


An Easter Message from Father Lameck

Alleluia Christ is Risen!!! Matthew 28:1-7 The Stone That Stood in the Way



In Matthew 28, we read that when Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary, came to the tomb, they found the stone rolled away. This was not a small, insignificant rock but a heavy barrier meant to seal the grave and signify the finality of death. It represented the obstacles that stands between humanity and God. Today, we give thanks to God because that stone was not too heavy for Him! The rolling away of the stone symbolises God's power to remove the burdens and barriers that keep us from experiencing His resurrection life.

What stones do you face today?

- Is it the stone of doubt, making you question God's love and promises?
- Is it the stone of guilt and shame, keeping you trapped in the past?
- Is it the stone of fear, preventing you from stepping into God's purpose for your life?

Just as God sent an angel to roll away the stone from Christ's tomb, He is willing and able to roll away the stones in your life. The angel's words to the women were simple yet life changing: "He is not here; He has risen!" (Matthew 28:6). The empty tomb is not a sign of loss, but of victory. Jesus' resurrection proves that:

- Death does not have the final say.
- Sin does not have the ultimate power over us.
- Hope is never lost for those who believe in Christ.

Because Jesus lives, we, too, can rise above our struggles, our sins, and even death itself. The same power that raised Jesus from the dead is available to us through faith (Romans 8:11). After encountering the risen Christ, the women did not stay at the tomb. They ran to tell the disciples the good news. This Easter, we are called to do the same.

We cannot keep the miracle of the resurrection to ourselves. The world needs to know that Jesus is alive and that His love and salvation are available to all. As we celebrate Easter, let us not linger around the tomb, mourning what is past. Instead, let us step into the new life that Christ has given us. Whatever stones have been weighing you down, trust that God can roll them away.

The grave is empty, and Jesus is alive! Because He lives, we can face tomorrow with hope, joy, and victory. He is risen! He is risen indeed!

Amen.

Trevor Glyn Jones- 72 years



Glyn was the son of Sir Trevor Jones, President of the Liberal Party and Lady Doreen Jones, Lord Mayor of Liverpool. Following in his parents' footsteps he was Press Officer of Oxford University Liberal Society. He was active in the Anti-apartheid student movement. After leaving university he had a gap year in the merchant navy before working in the Middle East. He followed this with a career in advertising in London before returning to work in the family shipping business in Liverpool.

Glyn married Carol in Tattenhall in the community he loved and supported. They spent happy years travelling and sharing a love of theatre, music and art. He leaves a daughter, Ayesha from a previous marriage and a step family; Hannah, Julian and Hannah's children Grace and Aidan. He also leaves his mother, his sister Louise, her husband Peter and his nephews Thomas and George. Just a few months after receiving a terminal cancer diagnosis, Glyn died peacefully at home on 2nd February, supported by last rites from Father Lameck and the love of his family.

Barbara Norma Jones (Norma) 1937 - 2025

Norma was born in Birkenhead and had a younger sister. After school she trained as a nurse and was a Ward Sister at the General Hospital. She married Alan in 1959 and they had three children. Changes of job for Alan took the family to Whitchurch Shrops, then to Lynhurst Broxton where they lived for 42 years and from where Norma worked at the

Dunham Heifer, the local playgroup and latterly The Pheasant.

Following retirement Norma joined Tattenhall Over Fifties and served on the committee for some years. She and Alan also enjoyed gardening, holidays to Scotland, and spending time with an expanding family. Norma had a stroke in 2014 and Alan became her carer. After he too became ill they took the decision to move into Iddenshall Hall where she took an active part in life there until a downturn in health in 2023 and she passed away peacefully in her room on 9th February. 8 May 1945 - Victory in Europe Day (VE DAY) - is a day etched in the memory of everyone who witnessed it.

After nearly six years of war Germany officially surrendered on 7 May 1945 and the conflict was finally over.

The unconditional surrender came after Adolf Hitler took his own life on 30 April as the Allies surrounded Berlin, and was authorised by his successor Grand Admiral Karl Dönitz.

News that the war in Europe had ended did not come as a surprise

and had been anticipated back in Britain for some time as the Allies advanced on Germany.

Commemorations will kick off on Bank Holiday Monday, which will see the Cenotaph dressed in Union flags, a Military procession and a flypast in London.

On 8th May there will be a service of remembrance and thanksgiving at Westminster Abbey followed by a concert.

An installation of ceramic poppies will return to the Tower of London to mark the anniversary. Nearly 30,000 of the original poppies from the 2014 display at the Tower, which commemorated the centenary of the First World War, will be displayed in a new installation within the walls of the fortress.

A Civic VE Day service has been pre-recorded by The Lord Mayor of Chester, The Chairman of Cheshire West and Chester Council and Chester Cathedral which will be available to watch online from May 8. Military Personnel, local dignitaries, clergy and school children have all contributed to the short service which has been recorded from their personal locations, including on board HMS Albion.






What is a Repair Café? – A Repair Café is a place where you can bring broken or defective household appliances, machines, clothing, ornaments, pictures or tools

for fixing by volunteers. A bit like the Repair Shop on TV but without the tears.





Do you sharpen tools? Yes, we can sharpen kitchen knives, garden shears, secateurs, loppers. But not chainsaws.

Is it new? We have been running this in Tattenhall since July 2022 and have fixed 299 items

Is it safe? We PAT test all electrical goods before any electrical repair and afterwards

Is it free? There is no fee, it is free. We gratefully receive any donations as there are costs we have to cover like room hire. We are all volunteers though.

Is it guaranteed? There is no guarantee, we try our best. At the moment our success rate is 70%

Why? To save you the cost of having to replace something. To save sending stuff to landfill. To save the CO_2 involved in having a new replacement thing. We reckon we have saved Tattenhall over £14,000 in replacement costs, and over 7000kg of CO_2
